Temple Emanu-El of Tuscaloosa, the University of Alabama's Hillel Jewish Student Center, and the Tuscaloosa Civil Rights History and Reconciliation Foundation will present a free screening of the documentary *Julius Rosenwald*, along with a panel discussion. Refreshments will be served.

Invited guests for the panel discussion include members of the Pickensville Rosenwald School Project.

The documentary tells the story of civil rights hero Julius Rosenwald (1862–1932), who made his fortune from his role in the success of the Sears department stores and their legendary mail-order marketing model. Rosenwald was one of his era's most generous philanthropists. From his synagogue's rabbi and the turn-of-the-century Settlement Movement, he learned that "property entails duties"--that his vast wealth came with a responsibility to those who had not been as fortunate as he had. Inspired by a visit to Tuskegee University in Alabama, Rosenwald teamed with Booker T. Washington to launch a project of unprecedented scope and generosity: the establishment of free schools and libraries for African American children across the South. By the 1930s, there were close to 5,000 such "Rosenwald Schools" across the South: from Texas, throughout the South, and up into Virginia and Maryland. Over 400 were in Alabama--3 in Tuscaloosa County alone. And yet, today, Rosenwald is a largely forgotten figure.

Come learn more about the man, his work, his life, and his drive to make others' lives better.

## This week's Torah portion: Va-y'chi [Jacob] Lived Genesis 47:28-50:26

*Jacob lived in the land of Egypt for 17 years; Jacob's days--the years of his life--were 147.  
- Genesis 47:28*

### SUMMARY:

- Jacob blesses his grandchildren Ephraim and Manasseh. (48:1-20)
- Jacob's twelve sons gather around his deathbed, and each receives an evaluation and a prediction of his future. (49:1-33)
- Joseph mourns his father's death and has Jacob embalmed. Jacob is buried in Hebron in the cave of the field of the Machpelah in the land of Canaan. (50:1-14)
- Joseph assures his concerned brothers that he has forgiven them and promises to care for them and their families. (50:15-21)
- Just before he dies, Joseph tells his brothers that God will return them to the Land that God promised to the patriarchs. The Children of Israel promise Joseph that they will take his bones with them when they leave Egypt. (50:22-26)
