I write these words during the Pesach season as the glow from our 1st Temple-Hillel Seder lingers....Central to our Haggadah is the obligation "to see ourselves as if we came forth from Egypt." That is, to embrace fully and completely this sad and tragic moment in our past, to fully and completely vow that it must never, ever be repeated, and to energize our own ongoing sense of moral obligations which flow from the experience of both slavery and liberation.

And yet, the month of May finds us commemorating two events which chart new directions for us in light of our past: Yom Ha-Shoah poignantly reminds us of the loss of nearly six million of our own, a wound which refuses to heal and a dream still alive in the minds of our enemies. And Yom Ha-Atzmaut, that glorious day 14 May 1948, when the Third Jewish Commonwealth—M'dinat Yisrael/the State of Israel—came into being, remains alive today despite its enemies and those who continue to seek to do her ill and worse. (It, too, however, is tinged with a moment of sadness as we commemorate Yom Ha-Zikaron in memory of those who fell during these past sixty plus years defending her very right to be.)

June, too, recalls the holy day of Shavuot, when, according to our tradition, Moshe Rabbeinu returned from Har Sinai with the Holy Torah in hand, a gift beyond compare and one which continues to exercise its hold up each and every one of us to the degree to which we continue to positively affirm our identity as Jews.

Thus, April, May, and June and their Hebraic calendar equivalents point us not only to our past, but to our present and future as well. They remind us quite dramatically where we have been, where we are, and where we are going. For just as the summer months are times of physical, emotional and spiritual renewal, so, too, does our Judaism nourish our very souls and prepares us for all of the myriad challenges which lie ahead, recalling our past, living our present, and positively looking forward to our future.

The April 27 tornado that destroyed so much of Tuscaloosa requires a sustained commitment from us to rebuild. The needs for our displaced citizens and for the city infrastructure will be massive, and it will take months—even years—of our commitment to aid before we can put this disaster behind us.

The outpouring of help now is, in a way, easy compared to keeping up the effort and patience we will all need in the months to come. Please give all the *time* you can over the next months to any need that presents itself. Please also give *funds* to agencies that provide direct help to individuals and families.

If you prefer to give through a Jewish organization, you can mail checks to our own **Jewish United Appeal Fund**, 903 20<sup>th</sup> Ave, Tuscaloosa, AL 35401. The JUAF is the 401c-3 non-profit umbrella organization that includes Temple and Hillel as members. Please mark the checks “tornado relief.” The JUAF will pass on 100% of your funds to one or more of the following:

**Temporary Emergency Services (TES), a United Way agency.** TES is at 1705 15<sup>th</sup> St, near the corner of Queen City and 15<sup>th</sup> and across from Shelby Park. Their storefront and office has been supplemented by a large donated warehouse next door.

TES gives CLOTHING AND FOOD out to families and individuals who have been referred by other aid agencies. Sisterhood has donated its garage-sale items to TES. They also need BUILDING MATERIALS.

But they badly need funds. Send checks to them at 1705 15<sup>th</sup> St., Tuscaloosa, 35401.

**Compassionate Coalition of Tuscaloosa County (CCTC) is “Volunteer Central.”** CCTC is a 401c-3 group of Tuscaloosa congregations of which Temple Emanu-El is a founding member. The current president is Sheldon Rosenzweig, a Temple member. Compassionate Coalition sprang into action as soon as the tornado had passed.

Nancy Green, the Mobilization Director of CCTC, is overseeing the volunteer screening effort that is housed at St. Matthias Church. As of April 30, they had registered 2500+ volunteers. You can register by going to the church, on Skyland Blvd next to our former Temple building. They badly need volunteers with specific skills:

- CONSTRUCTION SKILLS (especially licensed carpenters, electricians, plumbers, etc.) and right now those with experience handling demolition rubble. This isn't as easy as it sounds!
- PROFESSIONAL COUNSELORS. Licensed professionals such as psychologists, social workers, psychiatric nurses, etc.
- FOREIGN LANGUAGE PROFICIENCY, especially in Spanish and Chinese, but also American Sign Language. “Proficiency” means fluency—the ability to understand, translate, and interpret.
- COMPUTER SKILLS. The volunteer effort is working hard to data-base all those applications. Bring your own laptop!
- TREE AND BRUSH CLEARING. If there is a need for chopping up fallen branches and trees *in your own neighborhood*, by all means lend a hand. But chain saws can be dangerous! Don't tackle a big job alone, or if you do not have long experience with this kind of work.
- In the last few days, CCTC has deployed many groups of volunteers with VANS and PICKUP TRUCKS to deliver supplies to shelters. Don't try this on your own—you need a police pass.
- FUNDS: these are needed to keep this large effort afloat. Send checks to Compassionate Coalition, PO Box 1507, Tuscaloosa, AL 35403.

**BE PATIENT:** it will take time to organize all the people who've volunteered, and there will be much need in the weeks and months to come.



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## An Ambitious Summer Project to Help Tuscaloosa Children—especially those on the devastated West Side

The "Summer Food and Fun" (<http://summerfoodfun.blogspot.com/>) is a project coordinated by the Community Action Team of the Region Two State Perinatal Association whose purpose is to build community health through education and related activities. The project is a community initiative designed to address health and wellness issues while engaging the participants in other meaningful activities. The expected outcome of the initiative is to improve the overall health status of participants with immediate and long term results.

The summer project will be at the McDonald Hughes Community Center beginning June 7, 2011 and running through July 28, 2011 from 10:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon each Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday. The McDonald Hughes Center feeding site feeds 500-600 individuals, from ages 1-18, at no charge, Monday through Friday. We anticipate 300-400 participants each day ranging in age from 3-18, along with parents whose meal we will provide with funds collected from donations. Volunteers may have lunch at the site for a nominal fee.

We will engage participants in age-appropriate group activities based on the number of volunteers and space available. The goal is to have eight to ten groups with no more than twenty participants and a volunteer ratio of 5:20, depending upon the activity. Daily themes for the three day-a-week events will include:

**Healthy Living and Wellness** (includes preconception health, healthy eating habits, preventing heart disease, diabetes, cancer, exercise made fun, meditation, effective parenting, drug/alcohol education, etc.)

**Arts/Crafts/Music/Dance** (traditional arts and crafts, creative dance, music appreciation, experimenting with musical instruments, poetry, creative writing, etc.)

**Enrichment** (reading circles, targeted tutoring, career clubs, motivational speakers, book distribution, life skills, etc.)

### Project Objectives:

1. To provide structured activities at no cost to at-risk youth during the summer
2. To engage at-risk youth in activities focusing on health and wellness
3. To create opportunities for participants to discover and uncover talents in arts, music, self-expression, and to enhance spoken and written communication skills
4. To evaluate the effectiveness of the project and generate future plans
5. To disseminate findings
