From Rabbi Jacobs Hooray!



Dear Friends:

The May/June 2012 issue of *Moment* magazine, a Jewish quarterly journal, recently ran a symposium entitled "Will It Matter If There Is a Mormon President?" Asked to respond were an Independent Rabbi, a Humanist Rabbi, a Renewal Rabbi, a Reconstructionist Rabbi, a Reform Rabbi, a Conservative Rabbi, a Modern Orthodox Rabbi, a Sephardic Rabbi, and a Chabad Rabbi. And now here's Your Rabbi:

Mitt Romney's Mormonism, while I recognize it to be an influencing factor in both who he is and his decision-making process, is fundamentally irrelevant to his quest for the presidency and to my Jewish response to him, whether I choose to vote for him or his incumbent opponent. Like John F. Kennedy before him, should he be elected, he should and must be the President of the United States of America, evincing no preferences whatsoever for any persons or groups guided or governed by their religious orientations.

It is somewhat ironic that when Vice-President Al Gore ran for the presidency and selected Senator Joe Lieberman as his running mate, Lieberman's supposed Jewish Orthodoxy was, by and large, a campaign irrelevancy everywhere except the most virulent of hate sites. I suspect that objections to Romney's Mormonism is a further extension of the hate campaign to discredit President Obama's Christianity and make the claim that he wants to replace it with Islam (which is most definitely not the case).

We Jews have benefited from the solid wall of separation between church and state which remains a hallmark and most important foundation of this grand experiment we call the US of A.

Recognizing one's religious identity (or lack thereof), while an important insight into the character and integrity of the person running for political office, must never be allowed to become the factor which disqualifies one from seeking elected office. Should Romney lose the presidential election, I can only pray that it was not votes against his faith which were responsible.

From the President:

There are several issues that I believe should be a part of my last letter as your president. The first part deals with “Who I Think We Are”; the second is the “State of the Temple,” followed by what our “Future Opportunities” might be.

Who I Think We Are: Temple Emanu-El’s congregation is made up of many people who grew up following the tenets, ritual, and beliefs associated with the Orthodox, Conservative, and/or Reform elements of Jewish culture and tradition. Within each of these major divisions are additional separations based on practices and beliefs.

We as a congregation are stronger than many because we respect and recognize these individual differences. Our congregation is also diverse as our members come to Judaism by birth and by choice. For a group from such broad backgrounds to work, each of us has recognized that compromises have to be made, not in our individual beliefs but in appreciating that no one set of religious tenets is better than another. Each of our own beliefs must remain strong as we resist the need to influence others that our way is the best or only way to practice Judaism.

Temple Emanu-El has chosen Reform Judaism for many reasons. Over the more than one hundred years that Jewish congregations have existed in Tuscaloosa we have practiced Orthodox and Conservative forms of religion. Because of the membership’s broad base of belief we elected to choose Reform as the best format to satisfy community needs. Please remember that it has been said that a group of three Jews means at least five opinions. Who are we? We are Jews!

State of the Temple: The past year at Temple Emanu-El has been excellent. Our congregation has remained at almost the same number of members. The building has proven that we built a facility that meets our needs. We have celebrated the High Holiday services and accommodated all who wished to attend. We experienced another successful year in our Sunday school program. The board formed a Sunday School committee. We are in the process of establishing an office and records system. We have enjoyed our first Bat Mitzvah and Bar Mitzvah. We have enjoyed a number of sponsored Shabbat Onegs. We enjoyed our first in-Temple fundraiser. Our adult education program expanded from Torah study to many other enriching experiences. People have made the Temple stronger and we look forward to your participation.

The Future: A house of prayer is important but the people who fill it are the heart and life of Judaism. We, Tuscaloosa’s Jewish community, have over 100 years of local history. Through our history compromise was the key factor in our continuing existence. Our leaders and our congregations recognized that change was inevitable due to changing populations and economic conditions.

Our present identity as a Reform congregation has provided our diverse membership with the opportunity to maintain their own identity while being able to come together to celebrate their common belief as Jews. Our past successes were based on the commitment of people. Our future will be as bright as the commitment of our current group of people. Programs are good but nothing succeeds like people who are focused on continuing Judaism in Tuscaloosa. We look forward to a bright future because you are a part of that future.

I need to thank all of those who shared their knowledge and experience with me. These included the Rabbi, the Temple officers and board, the Temple secretary, Gale Zumpano, and Ron Hood. To all thank you.

MOURNING THE DEATH OF RABBI LEON JUDAH WEINBERGER

By Senator Allen

WHEREAS, with profound sorrow and regret, we receive news of the death of Rabbi Leon Judah Weinberger of Tuscaloosa, Alabama, on September 5, 2011, at the age of 85 years; and

WHEREAS, the passing of Rabbi Weinberger leaves a void in the lives of his loving family, his many friends, and the entire community, where he was highly regarded as a spiritual leader, author, and educator who impacted countless lives; and

WHEREAS, born on August 23, 1926, he received his Bachelor of Arts Degree from Clark University in Worcester, Massachusetts; his Master of Hebrew Literature Degree from the Jewish Theological Seminary of America in New York, New York; and his Ph.D. Degree from Brandeis University in Waltham, Massachusetts; and

WHEREAS, in 1964, he joined the Department of Religious Studies at The University of Alabama and taught at the university until retiring in 1999; during his distinguished tenure, he served as University Research Professor and as General Editor of the internationally respected Judaic Studies Series of The University of Alabama Press; among his recognitions and honors, he was recipient of the Burnum Distinguished Faculty Award and the Algernon Sydney Sullivan Award; and

WHEREAS, he also served as the beloved rabbi of Temple Emanu-El in Tuscaloosa for 25 years and made significant contributions to Jewish life and to the larger community as well; and

WHEREAS, over the course of his career, Rabbi Weinberger published 12 books, edited 38 more, wrote more than 90 articles and book reviews in both English and Hebrew, and delivered 20 papers at conferences throughout the United States and Israel; and

WHEREAS, he was recipient of a number of research grants from The University of Alabama, the National Endowment for the Humanities, and the Academy for Jewish Research; his extensive accomplishments are listed in such publications as Dictionary of American Scholars, Who's Who in World Jewry, Who's Who in American Jewry, and Contemporary Authors; and

WHEREAS, survivors include his wife of 28 years, Marcy Weinberger; daughter, Lisa Veldran; sons, Gary Weinberger and David Weinberger; and eight grandchildren; and

WHEREAS, Rabbi Weinberger was a valued member of the community; although his presence will be greatly missed, his memory will be cherished in the hearts and minds of those who were fortunate to know him; now therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA, That the death of Rabbi Leon Judah Weinberger is recorded with deep sorrow, and this resolution is offered in highest tribute to his life, along with heartfelt sympathy to his grieving family.

Shavuot: Receiving the Torah

The story of Shavuot originates in the Bible as the story of the receiving of the Torah. After the Exodus from Egypt, the Torah recounts how the Children of Israel proceeded to Mount Sinai in the desert. Moses went up the mountain to meet God, who gave him the Ten Commandments written on two tablets to be delivered to the Children of Israel.

Shavuot is also a harvest holiday. In the time of the Temples, the Children of Israel brought their first fruits to the Temple to offer to God at Shavuot. We read the Book of Ruth, and eat dairy treats:

Blintzes

Make 10-12 8" crepes from your favorite recipe; set aside.

Beat together a mixture of 1 c. ricotta or cottage cheese, ½ tsp. vanilla, and sugar or Splenda to taste.

Place some filling on the center of each crepe. Fold up the bottom, then fold in the sides, then roll the package over to completely enclose the filling. Blintzes can be frozen at this point.

When ready to eat, sauté blintzes on both sides in butter until golden brown and heated through. Serve with sour cream or fruit compote.

Medium-calorie Lemon Cheesecake

Crusts for cheesecakes are optional. If you want one, press it into a 10" springform pan and set aside.

Preheat oven to 350°.

Beat together until completely smooth: 3 8-oz. pkgs of Neufchatel 'cream' cheese, 3 large eggs, grated zest of one lemon, juice of the same lemon, 1 tsp. salt, 1 tsp. vanilla, 1/2 c. sugar or Splenda, (or more to taste). Scrape batter into prepared pan, bake 35-40 minutes.

Cake will fall as it cools. Fill the depression with fresh fruit if desired. Serve chilled.
