 - **Associate Status** (for those with full membership in another synagogue non-voting): 50% of applicable category
- Note: "Family" is defined as a household with more than one person. "Senior" is age 65 and over.*

We have moved on to study the Talmud, the writings of the Prophets. This is the second division of the sacred writings. In the Hebrew canon the Prophets are divided into (1) the Former Prophets (Joshua, Judges, Samuel, and Kings) and (2) the Latter Prophets (Isaiah, Jeremiah, Ezekiel, and the Twelve, or Minor, Prophets: Hosea, Joel, Amos, Obadiah, Jonah, Micah, Nahum, Habakkuk, Zephaniah, Haggai, Zechariah, and Malachi). We will be working from *The Jewish Study Bible*, ed. by Brettler and Michael Fishbane. The book is easily available from Amazon (and use **AmazonSmile**—see below!).

This should be a fascinating continuation of our study, and we hope that many of you will join the discussion.
